William Hibben McLain Serves Two Enlistments In The Civil War

William Hibben McLain was the first child born to Ann Maria Hibben and her second husband, John McLain. He was born on February 2, 1842, in Washington Court House, Fayette County, Ohio.² He followed his father's trade, that of farmer. William served in Company B of the 12th Regiment of the Ohio Volunteer Infantry between January 20 and July 20, 1861. He then enlisted again in Co. I of the 31st Regiment of the Ohio Volunteer Infantry on January 1, 1864. "*List of deserters dated near Savannah, Ga. Dec. 16, 1864 show him deserted Nov. 12, 1864 at Kingston, Ga. April 30/65 present. Returned from desertion Apr. 10/65. Under arrest. To make good time lost by desertion, 4 months & 23 days.*"³ However, the end of the war was near and the records show that the charge of desertion and absence without leave were removed from his records. He received an honorable discharge on July 20, 1865, at Louisville, Kentucky.

When John McLain died in 1868, William evidently moved from Wilmington to live on the farm with his widowed mother. Less than two months after his father's death, William married Cynthia B. Taylor on September 3, 1868.⁴ They had four children: Warren Taylor McLain was born on October 10, 1869; Maud Cornelia McLain, on December 16, 1871; Lloyd B. McLain, on October 6, 1875; and Anne M. McLain, on March 12, 1885.⁵

On March 14, 1888, a legal notice was published in the Wilmington, Ohio paper recording that W. H. McLain was appointed the new administrator of the will and estate of his uncle, William Hibben.⁶ Both of the administrators appointed when the trust had been established in 1868 for William Hibben by his father, had died.

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Civil War pension medical affidavits indicate that William H. McLain suffered from *disease of stomach & heart, rheumatism & nasopharyngeal catarrh.*⁷ By 1893, he was unable to perform manual labor. He attributed the cause to Civil War service and was granted a partial disability pension.

William Hibben McLain died at Wilmington, Ohio on July 29, 1908. His obituary provides a comprehensive review of his life and final day.

Another sudden and unexpected death occurred Wednesday evening in Wilmington. After spending an evening of pleasure in company with old army comrades at the G. A. R. Hall, where a fish-bake was enjoyed, William H. McLain, soon after reaching home at 9:30, died while seated in his chair, of heart failure, having been afflicted with heart disease a long time. He was a native of this county, being the son of John and Ann Hibben McLain, and was born on the home farm adjoining Wilmington on the southwest, now owned by Willis Cartwright. At the age of twenty, April 22, 1861, he enlisted in Company B, Twelfth O. V. I. and entered the army under Captain R. B. Harlan,⁸ serving until the expiration of his term, August 22. August 8, 1862, he again enlisted, under Captain David F. Miller, in Company I, Thirty-first Ohio, and was discharged as a veteran volunteer August 8, 1865, serving his country with honor as private and non-commissioned officer. Returning home he engaged in farming and on retiring from that, in other vocations. He was married to Cynthia Taylor, daughter of the late Justus and Cynthia Taylor, and to this union were born four children, two sons and two daughters, who with the widow survive. One son, Warren, is employed with Rand & McNally, in Chicago, another, 'Ted,' is in the furniture business in Columbus, while a married daughter, Mrs. Maud Carlile also resides in that city. The hope of the deceased as to the manner of his death was realized. Frequently during his life he had expressed the wish that when his time came he might die suddenly. His father died many years ago just as the subject to this paragraph did, and at that time he said to his family that he hoped he might go the same way. Last Monday night when he heard of the sudden death of his sister-in-law [Emma Dill Taylor], again he said he hoped he would die in that manner. The end came to him even more suddenly than to her. Knowing his desire was thus gratified the shock of his death to his family is somewhat lessened. Funeral services were held at the home Saturday evening and interment made in Sugar Grove Cemetery.⁹

Just a week later, Cynthia applied for and was subsequently granted a Civil War widow's pension.¹⁰ She lived for the rest of her life with daughter Anne, first on Summit Street and then later on Chittenden Avenue, in Columbus, Ohio.¹¹ She died February 21, 1929, in Columbus, twenty years later.

"TO BURY MRS. M'LAIN HERE Services will be held at Holladay funeral home Thursday, at 2 P. M. Mrs. Cynthia Taylor McLain died at her home in Columbus Monday, at 3:15 P. M., according to word received by relatives here. She was a daughter of the late Justus and Cynthia Robinson Taylor and was born in Greenfield, May 12, 1845. She is the last surviving member of a family composed of six daughters and three sons. For many years she made her home in Wilmington but upon the death of her husband, 20 years ago, she removed to

Columbus, where she has since resided. During her residence here she was a faithful member of the Baptist church and an enthusiastic worker in the Woman's Relief Corps. She is survived by her four children, Warren McLain of Chicago; Mrs. Charles Carlile, of Columbus; Lloyd McLain of Canton and Ann McLain, in the home; three grandchildren, Frederick Carlile, Katherine Carlile and Neil McLain, and three great grandchildren. Mrs. T. M. Burnett is a niece and Herbert D. Wire a nephew. Services will be held at the C. L. Carlile home, in Columbus, on Wednesday evening, at 7:30, and on Thursday, at the C. A. Holladay Funeral Home, at 2 P. M., conducted by Rev. N. E. Bennett who has officiated at the funeral services of 12 members of the Taylor family. Interment will be made in Sugar Grove cemetery.¹²

Both Cynthia and William H. McLain are buried in a William Hibben lot at Sugar Grove Cemetery.¹³

Additional Information About William and Cynthia's Children

Warren T. McLain married Nora (unknown) in about 1896, probably in Indiana. He is recorded in the Census of 1900 as a printing foreman, with a two year old son, Neil, born in August 1897 and living in Elwood City, Indiana.¹⁴ His printing trade took the family to Chicago where Warren found employment with Rand McNally Company.

Mr. Warren McLain, who was called here from Chicago by the death of his father, the late William McLean [McLain], has a lucrative position in the extensive printing establishment of the Rand McNally company, with an early prospect of promotion. It is over twenty-four years since Warren started at the printer's trade in the DEMOCRAT office. He manifested an aptitude for printing from the start and eventually became an expert job printer.¹⁵

Records of Warren's family life in Chicago have not been found. There is no known record of Nora's or his death.

Maud McLain married Charles Lawrence Carlile about 1894. At the age of eight in 1847, Charles' father, William, came to America from England. He served with distinction in the Civil War, was wounded during the battle of Chickamauga and was mustered out as Captain, Company C of the 31st OVI.

In 1869, he went to Columbus and was employed in a woodworking business called Halm, Bellows and Butler. By 1867, he was working for one James Pleukarp, making extension tables for home and office use. Three years later, he decided to go into business for himself once again, making and selling woven wire mattresses and a variety of furniture products. . . .Because he made and sold quality products, the Carlile furniture business became one of the most successful in central Ohio. In 1879, W. S. Carlile leased a large building at North High and Vine Streets. The company soon had two branch locations in other parts of the city.¹⁶

Charles Carlile grew up learning all phases of the furniture business and succeed his father as president, managing the business until his death. On September 28, 1896, Frederick William Carlile was born to Charles and Maud. A daughter, Katharine Mae Carlile (Donges)

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was born March 2, 1906. Both children, in turn, actively participated in the business until their deaths in 1960 and 1998, respectively.

Maude was an active member of the DAR and researched her Taylor ancestors. She was granted certification by the DAR as the great granddaughter of Reuben Taylor (1761-1845), a participant in the Revolutionary War.¹⁷ It is not known if she was aware of Thomas Hibben's (1760-1833) participation in the same conflict.

Charles L. Carlile died April 15, 1943. Maude died October 30, 1958. Both are buried at Greenlawn Cemetery, Columbus, Ohio.

In 1900 Lloyd B. McLain was twenty-four, living with his parents on Dennison Street in Columbus, Ohio and working as a furniture salesman.¹⁸ About 1902 he married Dora Bella (unknown), born about 1878, and by 1910 had moved to Canton, Stark County, Ohio. He was a salesman in a '*furniture house*.' Dora Bella and Lloyd had not had any children during their eight year marriage.¹⁹ In 1920 Lloyd was recorded in the Pittsburgh, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania census as head of a household which included his sister-in-law, Ida C. Ogden, and two boarders. Both Ida and Lloyd were recorded as widowed. Lloyd was employed as a salesman of '*beds*.'²⁰ Then in 1830 the census located Lloyd back in Canton, Ohio working as a sales manager for '*upholstered furniture*.' He had been married again in about 1921, this time to a Florence (unknown), born about 1893. No children are recorded.²¹ No additional information has been found about Lloyd and his second wife.

Anne M. McLain never married. She supported herself as a medical secretary and cared for her mother for twenty years. To her sister's family she was known as Nana McLain. Anne died October 26, 1965, at the age of eighty, in Columbus, Ohio and was buried next to her parents at Sugar Grove Cemetery, Wilmington, Ohio.²²

Postscript

In 1934 the only descendants of William Hibben known to the Sugar Grove Cemetery administrators were the four McLain siblings. At the request of the administrators, they signed a document surrendering their right, title and interest in lot 13 in section 3 of the cemetery in consideration of cancellation of dues in arrears on the lot.²³ The lot had been purchased by William Hibben in 1857 and was unused.



Sally Jennie McLain Marries Nathan Millikan

Sally Jennie McLain was born June 16, 1846, in Wilmington, Ohio.²⁴ She married Nathan Millikan on November 30, 1865.²⁵ Her parents and grandparents were friends of the Millikan family which arrived in Clinton County, Ohio before 1820. Several real estate transactions link the families and one documents that Hibben and Millikan properties abutted in Wilmington, Ohio.²⁶

Sally and Nathan Millikan had three sons: James McLain Millikan, born September 4, 1866,²⁷ William C. Millikan, November 8, 1868; and Joseph H. Millikan, born about 1870.²⁸

The Millikan family lived in the village of Wilmington all their lives. Nathan's occupation was recorded in the census reports as farmer and teamster, so the farm probably was nearby.²⁹ By 1885 all of William Hibben's living descendants, except Sally and her family had moved from Wilmington. Therefore, when a death of a relative occurred and the burial was to be

in Sugar Grove Cemetery, the remains were returned to the Millikan home for the memorial service. Among the deceased so documented are: James C. Leaming, September 1888; Ruth Ann McLain Smith, October 1888; Harry James Leaming, March 1889; Ephraim Thomas Leaming, November 1895; and Patience Quinn Hibben, November 1900.

Sally Jennie Millikan died August 24, 1910, and Nathan Millikan died November 15, 1915. Both died in Wilmington and are buried in the Millikan family lot in Sugar Grove Cemetery.³⁰

Nathan Millikan passed away at his home on South Spring street, near the gas house, this morning about 10 o'clock. He had been ill about 10 days suffering with pneumonia.

The deceased was about 78 years of age and leaves three sons—James; William, who is superintendent of the electric light plant at Lebanon, and Joe, a railroad man of Columbus. His wife passed away about ten years ago.

Mr. Millikan served on the Wilmington police force for about 15 years. It is a coincidence that he and J. W. Wire, who is lying at the point of death, engaged in business together at the present Wire stand in 1864—51 years ago.³¹

Additional Information About Sally And Nathan's Children

William C. Millikan married Cora Ann Conner in 1898, and initially worked for the Wilmington Gas Company. A son, Jessie N. Millikan, was born in November 1899. By the time the 1900 US Census was taken, William and Cora had moved to Lebanon, Warren County, Ohio, where William was hired as an electrician.³² By 1910, William and Cora had two more children, one of whom died as an infant. The other was William J. Millikan who was born in 1910, three months before the census was taken. In that census William C. Millikan was working as an engineer at the Light Company.³³ Cora died April 13, 1916,³⁴ leaving William with her two young sons. The 1920 Census reveals that William did not marry again.³⁵ William died on May 7, 1923. It is not known what became of Jessie, age 23 and William, age 12. Cora and William Millikan are buried in Sugar Grove Cemetery.³⁶

Joseph H. Millikan married Maude Morris on November 22, 1893, in Clinton County, Ohio.³⁷ They lived in California during their later years. Maude died November 13, 1929, in Pomona, California as a result of injuries sustained in an auto accident.³⁸ Her remains were returned to Wilmington and buried in Sugar Grove Cemetery.³⁹ At the age of 66, Joseph died November 7, 1936, in Pomona, California and was buried there.⁴⁰

Civil War And Other Maladies Shape Ruth Ann McLain's Life

Ruth Ann McLain, the last child of Ann Maria Hibben and John McLain, was born March 11, 1848, in Wilmington, Ohio. No documentation about her early life has been found. Military records provide extensive information about Ruth Ann's first husband, Warren S. Fuller. They were married October 24, 1867, four years after Warren received a medical discharge from Company I, 31st Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry.

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Warren was a druggist before he enlisted for three years on March 18, 1862. He was a hospital steward and participated in battles at Shiloh and Louisville, Kentucky. In July 1863, his mother wrote to David Todd, Governor of Ohio. The letter was endorsed by thirty-one prominent citizens of Wilmington, including David Sanders, A. C. Diboll, R. B. Harlan and James Fife.

Your petitioner, undersigned, represent that Warren S. Fuller, a Private of Company I, 31st Ohio Volunteers, (now acting hospital steward) is her only son, that he is nineteen years of age, and since he entered the Service, his father has departed this life, and left your petitioner a widow, with two minor children, Malissa, aged 16 years and Jennie aged 13 years, who are dependent upon her for support. Your petitioner further represents that she has no income, beyond the amount which was allowed for her year's maintenance, from September 18, 1862, and that she is now and has been for 6 years in feeble health. Your petitioner, therefore, humbly prays, that your Excellency will recommend, to the Authorities in Washington, the discharge of her son from the service: and she will ever pray, etc. Martha Fuller⁴¹

Warren's discharge on December 22, 1863, was for medical reasons and not as a result of the petition. At the age of four, he had suffered partial paralysis of his lower right leg which resulted in its being smaller and weaker.⁴² Nevertheless, he had been accepted in the service. This disability and a heart condition contracted prior to enlistment were the reason he was declared unfit for further duty.

Warren's death on February 5, 1869,⁴³ just sixteen months after his marriage, may have been due to his heart condition, endocarditis with disease of the mitral valves. He was not yet twenty-six years old. Burial was in the William Hibben lot at Sugar Grove Cemetery.⁴⁴

Death Cuts Short Ruth's Second Marriage

After Warren's death, Ruth returned to live with her mother.⁴⁵ After several years she remarried. Again, she married a Civil War veteran, Jerome D. Smith. He had served a full three years in Company B of the 40th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and was discharged in October 1864.⁴⁶ After the war, due to the after effects of 'lung fever' contracted during the war, he was unable to perform farm labor. He found employment as a police officer.

The marriage took place on January 19, 1871, in Wilmington, Ohio. A son, Charles M. Smith was born August 17, 1872. Three other children were born, but died while infants. When Charles was just sixteen, Ruth died.

Mrs. Jerome Smith. Died at her home in Washington C. H., Ohio, on last Wednesday morning, October 31, 1888, in the forty-first year of her age, after a protracted illness of a complication of diseases.

Mrs. Ruth Ann Smith was the second daughter of John and Ann Maria McLain, both not deceased, and was born in Wilmington, Clinton county, Ohio, March 21, 1848. In early womanhood she was united in marriage with Warren Fuller, with whom she lived happily eighteen short months, when death claimed him as its own. In 1870 she was again married, this time to Jerome Smith, formerly of this place. Four children were the fruit of this union—two boys and two girls—all save one of whom preceded their mother to that heavenly borne in their infancy. The kind, indulgent and grief-stricken husband and remaining son, Charles, are left to mourn their unexpected bereavement of an affectionate wife and mother.

For years a confirmed invalid, her life was one of trial and affliction, and yet a murmur scarcely escaped her lips, and her patient endurance will ever be tenderly remembered by husband and son. . . .The remains, accompanied by the relatives, arrived here Thursday morning, and were taken to the residence of her sister, Mrs. Nathan Millikan, on Spring street, near Sugartree, from whence the funeral occurred at half-past three o'clock in the afternoon, Rev. N. E. Bennett, of the Baptist Church of this place, officiating, interment taking place in the family lot in Sugar Grove cemetery.⁴⁷

The 1900 Census records that Jerome D. Smith was employed as a hotel clerk and was boarding with the hotel keeper.⁴⁸ He died May 12, 1902, at Washington Court House, Fayette County, Ohio, and was buried in the William Hibben lot at Sugar Grove Cemetery in Wilmington, Ohio.⁴⁹ No information has been found about Jerome's son, Charles M. Smith.
